Assessment at Limehurst in Years 7, 8 and 9

When we report on progress, students are given a **Current Outcome Marker (COM)** of *Support, Secure* or *Stretch.*

We explain these markers to students using the following language:

Support

- You may remember some things, but not lots of what you have been taught.
- Your teacher will help you to correct mistakes and to be able to complete work.
- With practise you will remember more of what you have been taught and complete your work.

Secure

- You will accurately remember lots of what you have been taught.
- Your teacher will guide you to apply your knowledge to more challenging work.
- With practise you will be able to accurately remember more, and complete complex work regularly.

Stretch

- You will accurately remember most of what you have been taught, particularly when recalling knowledge over a longer period of time.
- Your teacher will guide you to link your knowledge and understanding together to tackle the most challenging work.
- With practise, you will retain detailed knowledge over a long period of time, allowing you to complete more complex work independently.

When do we report on student progress in Key Stage 3?

In Key Stage 3 we report student performance twice a year:

- January: How effectively students are learning the curriculum at this point (informed by ongoing formative and summative classroom assessment).
- July: How well students demonstrate what they have learned this year and in their previous learning.
- We will also discuss student performance at Parents' Evenings and we encourage students to attend these along with their parents or carers. Year Nine Parents' Evening is on Monday 6th March, Year Eight Parents' Evening is on Monday 24th April and Year Seven Parents' Evening is on Monday 12th June.

What do we assess in Key Stage 3?

Assessment is driven by our <u>curriculum</u>. At Key Stage 3 we assess students' knowledge in **two** ways. The depth of their:

• **Declarative knowledge** – how well a student <u>knows</u> the core information and ideas they have been taught in each subject.

• **Procedural knowledge** – how well a student *is able to apply* this information and these ideas. This may be through practical skills, solving problems or composing an argument.

The blend of these two aspects of knowledge allows a student to know both **'what' and 'why'** and **'how to'**.

What does formative assessment look like?

Formative assessment checks for student understanding as new knowledge is introduced, and might take the form of:

- Questioning in lessons
- Live marking of students' work
- Quizzes in lessons or set as homework
- Other forms of retrieval practice for students
- Practice examination style questions or essays in class or set as homework

Teachers will use this formative assessment to help them plan lessons and provide feedback to students about what they need to do next. Such feedback will concentrate on students' learning gaps and how to close these.

What does summative assessment look like?

Summative assessment is used to make judgements about how well students are learning and remembering the curriculum over a period of time, and might take the form of:

- A test, exam or assessment
- An exam style question taken in timed or 'closed' conditions
- An extended piece of work
- A practical assessment
